

Video: *Flooded road*

Audio, male narrator, music in background: Floods... High water... They're not uncommon in Virginia.

Video: *Aerial view of flooded town*

Audio: Rivers and tributaries break out of their banks and endanger people and property.

Video: *Flooded road*

Audio: Much of that property is part of Virginia's transportation infrastructure.

Video: *Crews working on washed-out road*

Audio: When damage occurs, VDOT steps in.

Video: *Aerial view of flooded road*

Audio: After flooded roads and damaged bridges are identified ...

Video: *Crew post closed road sign*

Audio: ... VDOT crews set up detours.

Video: *Closed road*

Audio: They report road conditions to be posted on the agency's Web site.

Video: *Crew working on damaged road*

Audio: Crews make every effort to keep transportation lanes open — often by making temporary repairs until conditions improve.

Video: *Aerial of work under bridge after flood*

Audio: As soon as possible, VDOT engineers assess the damage ...

Video: *Crew removing trees and other debris from road*

Audio: ... and make careful estimates of the cost of repairs.

Video: *Crew working on bridge with flood debris underneath*

Audio: VDOT then writes contracts and puts crews to work as soon as possible.

Video: *Cleaning mud from road*

Audio: It's not easy, and it takes time. But VDOT wins against floods.

Video: *Aerial of road after flood*

Audio: Roads and bridges are restored, and Virginians keep moving!
