

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The primary purpose of this project is to improve the sight distance on Route 20 at the Route 631 intersection located at the crest of a substandard vertical curve in Buckingham County. The existing intersection sight distance is limited for vehicles approaching the intersection from the east attempting to turn onto Route 20. The proposed project will lower the grade of the vertical curve on Route 20, optimize sight distance and improve the intersection alignment.

The proposed roadway for Route 20 will consist of two 12-ft lanes, 6-ft shoulders (9-ft where guardrail is required) and appropriate drainage.


The design of this project is in compliance with the Stormwater Management Act, stormwater management standards and specifications approved by the Virginia Department of

Conservation and Recreation. The construction of this project will conform to the nationwide best management practices, VDOT specifications and special provisions, and Virginia Department of Soil and Water Conservation regulations. Also, during construction every reasonable effort will be made to protect the environment with respect to dust and erosion control.

Access to all properties will be maintained during construction.

The current average daily traffic (ADT) volume of Route 20 is 3622 (Design ADT 4129) with a significant percentage of truck traffic. This is the primary north-south corridor in the county.

This cost is subject to change because development of the project is in early design stages. The project will be financed using federal and state funds.

Environmental Review

VDOT's Lynchburg District Environmental Office has performed environmental reviews and coordination to obtain information about environmental resources in the project vicinity; to provide natural and historic resource agencies an opportunity to review and comment on the project during its development; and to identify opportunities for avoidance, minimization and mitigation of potential environmental impacts.

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) is applicable to this project and a Programmatic Categorical Exclusion has been developed in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration and in accordance with federal guidelines. The NEPA document includes information from various technical reviews including those related to natural resources, water quality, threatened and endangered species, air quality, noise, etc. In compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106 and 36 CFR Part 800, information concerning the potential effects of the proposed project on properties listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places is also provided in the environmental documentation.

The project will continue to be coordinated with the appropriate federal, state, and local agencies as part of environmental review and approval processes required throughout project development and construction. All required environmental clearances and permits will be obtained prior to commencement of construction. Strict compliance with all environmental conditions and commitments resulting from regulatory approvals, and implementation of VDOT's specifications and standard best management practices will protect the environment during construction.

The NEPA document and the results of other environmental studies are available at today's meeting. Representatives from VDOT's Environmental Section are available to discuss this information and to answer questions.

Anticipated Schedule

The following schedule has been proposed:

Design hearing comment period – ends January 17 (January 24 in case of inclement weather)

Approval of location and design – February 2013

Authorize Right of Way – October 2013

Advertise for construction – December 2014

Construction complete – August 2015

Civil Rights

Right of Way

The construction of the Route 20 improvement project will require the displacement of no families, businesses or non-profit organizations.

As we further develop the design of this project, additional easements for utility relocation may be required beyond the proposed right of way shown on the public hearing plans. The property owners will be informed of the exact location of the easements during the right of way acquisition process and prior to construction.

Information about right of way purchase is discussed in VDOT's brochure, "Right of Way and Utilities: a Guide for Property Owners and Tenants." Copies of this brochure are available here from a VDOT right of way agent.

After this meeting, information regarding right of way may be obtained from the right of way contact listed on the back of this brochure.

Get Involved

Ten days after this public hearing (January 17, 2013 or January 24, 2013 in case of inclement weather), the public comment period will close. VDOT will review and evaluate any information received as a result of this location and design hearing. This information, including the hearing summary, will be available for review at the VDOT office address listed below.

After all comments have been addressed, the information received as a result of the hearing will be presented to VDOT's Chief Engineer or designee for approval.
